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Epitaph to the Unknown Warrior

After the First World War many men who had died in battle were buried under new headstones which all had the same simple design.

There was space for 4 lines written by families to remember their loved one.

These messages are often called epitaphs. The words tell us what was so special about this person and what they still mean to families and friends.

The epitaphs on the First World War graves are written in many different languages because men from all over the world fought for Britain.

To write an epitaph for the Unknown Warrior in Westminster Abbey.

Instructions for working in pairs

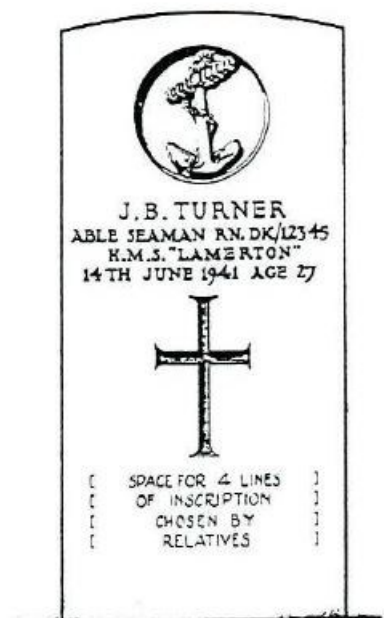
Read through the real First World War epitaphs about named soldiers and the writing on the Grave of the Unknown Warrior.

Imagine how his family felt about him and think about how we in Britain today feel about soldiers like him. Talk about these feelings with your partner. Start 'We...'



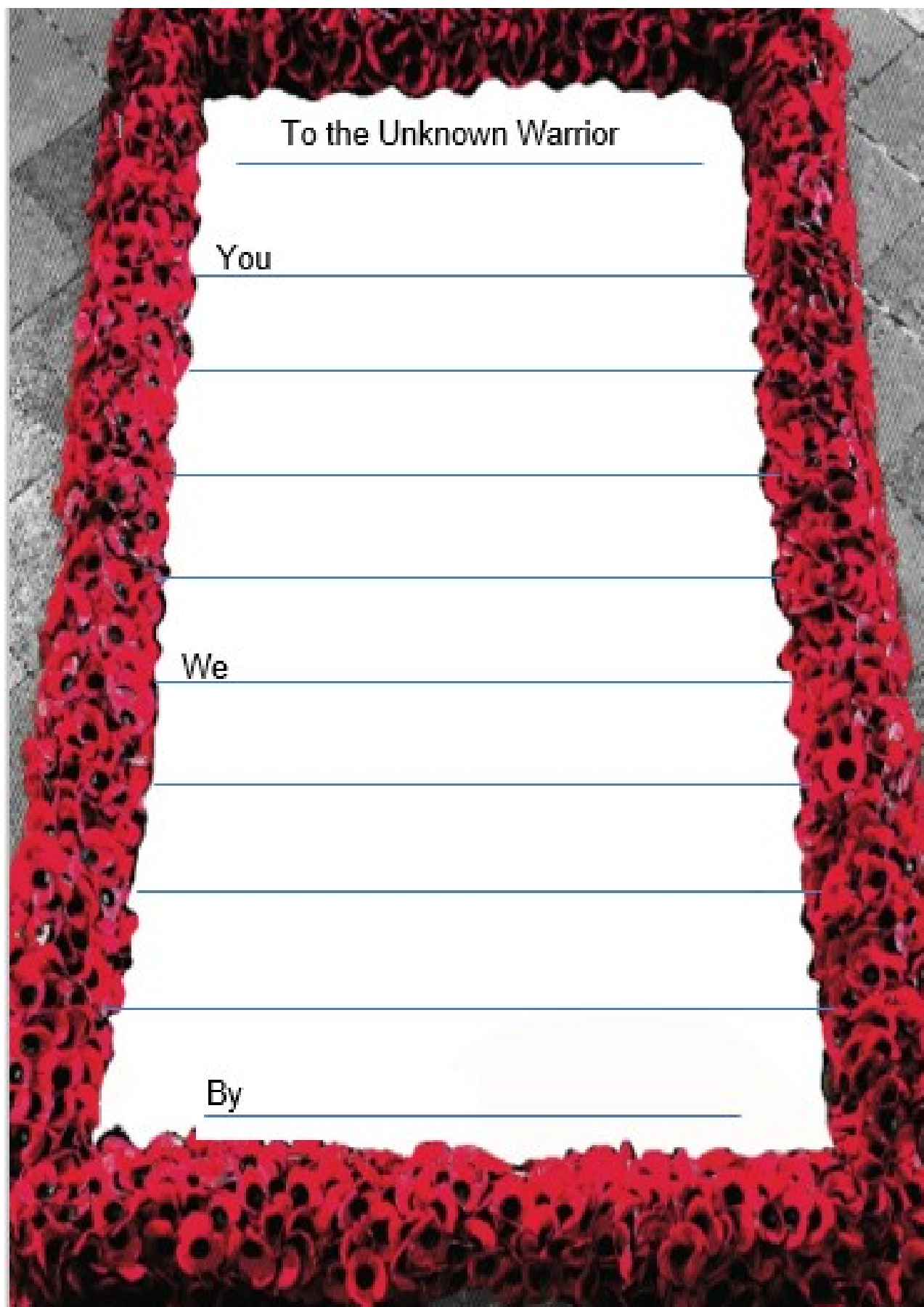
A standard Commission headstone with rounded top.
